- 8. It isn't pointed out clearly, but one of the opening shots shows a much-younger Carl being voted "Man of the Year." What do you think happened to make him so dismal now?
- 9. Was smoking pot necessary for the students to lower their inhibitions? Why?
- 10. How did self-disclosure (sharing intimate details) assist the students in developing a sense of "team"?
- 11. Who do you think was the team leader? What qualities made him/her rise to that position? Were you surprised?
- 12. Would the team-building have been affected today, since the students would have been more-diverse and using technology (cell phones, wireless devices, etc.)?
- 13. What scene/dialogue assisted the group in developing each of the following: rapport, respect, peer understanding, and moral maturity? How did developing those qualities help in the students' development into a team?
- 14. Why do you think the essay topic was "Who do you think you are?", if Mr. Vernon had preconceived notions about each student?
- 15. The five disciplines Peter Senge write about in the context of Organizational Learning are Personal Mastery, Mental Models, Building Shared Vision, Systems Thinking, and Team Learning. Identify one example of each of these disciplines from the movie.
